SPEAKING WITH MARY: ST. ROMANOS, A VOICE, AND THE VIRGIN



LECTURE

Most Christians who are devoted to the Virgin Mary today share the idea that she speaks on behalf of humans as an intercessor. In the first Christian centuries, however, she largely appeared as a reserved and quiet person who did not raise her voice. This lecture will explore a crucial crossroads in Marian history, as the Theotokos and another voiceless person, Romanos the Melodist (ca 485-560), come together through a scroll, exchanging the gift of speech.

About the speaker

Thomas Arentzen is a Postdoctoral Research Fellow at the University of Oslo, a Reader in Church History from Lund University, and currently a Fellow in Byzantine Studies at Dumbarton Oaks. He teaches Church History and has published books and articles in the fields of Byzantine Studies and homiletics.
